

# Celebrated musician presents West African kora performance on Oct. 16

The campus will host a kora performance by internationally renowned composer, musician and educator <u>John Hughes</u> at **4 p.m. Monday, Oct. 16** in the main lounge at Hammond Hall. Admission is free and open to the public.

The kora is a West African stringed instrument with origins dating back at least to the 13th century. Hughes, who has released six albums of original music, has studied the music, song and dance of West Africa for more than 28 years, training with numerous master drummers and dancers from Guinea and Mali. His musical style crosses cultural boundaries and fuses disparate influences.

- Creative coding projects that feature code or media generated by AI
- Films/videos that feature images and/or audio generated by Al
- Generative Art Installations: Physical or digital art installations where generative Al contributes to the art-making process

- Musical Compositions: Pieces of music that are composed or performed in collaboration with AI algorithms
- Language and Cultural Projects: Linguistic studies or cultural commentaries that make creative use of AI to understand or represent human culture
- Al in Theater: Plays or skits where dialogues, scenes, or plots have been generated or modified by Al
